I am writing to you with 37 years of experience as a rural doctor, having dedicated my career to providing comprehensive medical care in ______, a small rural town classified as MMR 5. My experience spans across obstetrics, trauma, emergency, and inpatient care, uniquely positioning me to understand the intricacies and challenges faced in rural healthcare. I am advocating for the recognition of Rural Generalist Medicine as a distinct specialty, a move I believe is essential for the advancement of healthcare in Australia's rural communities.

- 2. Enhanced Recruitment and Retention: A formal recognition will elevate the status and appeal of Rural Generalist Medicine, aiding in the recruitment and retention of doctors in rural areas. It acknowledges the complexity and importance of the role, which can be a significant factor in attracting new practitioners.
- 3. Improved Healthcare Outcomes: Specialization leads to better healthcare outcomes. Doctors trained specifically in Rural Generalist Medicine will be better equipped to address the unique challenges of rural healthcare, ultimately improving the health and wellbeing of rural communities.
- 4. Research and Development: This recognition can spur focused research and development in rural health issues, leading to innovations tailored to the needs of these communities.

My decades of experience have shown me the resilience and dedication of rural healthcare professionals.
