Question 2: Regarding suggestions to add to the draft

I would like to raise awareness to a cohort of SIMGs who were deemed partially comparable by their specialist colleges and were required to complete some requirements to gain Specialist recognition in Australia.

Though they were unable to complete their college requirements (eg not pass an exam), but due to their substantial work experience in Australia at the level of a senior Clinician/consultant, have been allowed to work as Senior medical officers/consultants without the title of "Specialist" in "Areas of need location ie regional or rural areas"

In my opinion, this cohort of doctors should be considered for a review as well. My question is: can they be included in this expedited specialist pathway as well? They are working at the level of a "specialist" (consultant/SMO role) without the title.

There is a huge number of these cohort of doctors. I live in a regional town and these cohort of doctors are helpful in mitigating the health gap we face as residents in regional areas but since they are not able to bill as specialist, their role could be limiting and less attractive for empolyment in our public hospitals.

Question 3: No, the draft advocates for increased access to specialist care which will benefit every Australian particularly the rural and remote dwellers
