

Accreditation in the National Registration and Accreditation Scheme:

A snapshot 2024/25

Introduction

The National Registration and Accreditation Scheme (the Scheme) was established by the Health Practitioner Regulation National Law (the National Law) in July 2010.

The Scheme is multi-professional, regulating more than 950,000+ health practitioners across 16 professions. The accreditation functions in the National Law include developing accreditation standards, accrediting programs of study against approved accreditation standards and assessing internationally qualified health practitioners (IQHP).

Accreditation is integral to the Scheme as it is the key to ensure that individuals seeking registration have the knowledge, skills and professional capabilities to safely and competently practise their profession in Australia.

The **Snapshot of Accreditation** is a yearly summary of whole of scheme information about accreditation activities. This version is current at 30 June 2025.

Accreditation

What is it?

Program Accreditation

Program accreditation is the process of assessing whether an educational program of study and the education provider that provides the program produce graduates who have the knowledge, skills and professional capabilities to safely and competently practise the profession in Australia.

Practitioner Assessment

Practitioner assessment is the process of assessing whether an internationally qualified health practitioner has demonstrated the knowledge, clinical skills, and professional capabilities to safely and competently practise the profession in Australia.

Who performs accreditation?

The accreditation authorities (six accreditation committees and 10 accreditation councils) exercise accreditation functions in the National Scheme. They develop and review accreditation standards, assess and accredit programs, provide advice to the National Boards, and monitor compliance. Some accreditation authorities evaluate internationally qualified health practitioners.

Accreditation snapshot 24/25

If the Accreditation Authority is an external council, the council works with the National Board to deliver specified accreditation functions under a formal agreement with Ahpra on the Board's behalf. If the Accreditation Authority is a committee, the committee works with the National Board according to the committee's terms of reference.

Accreditation in the National Scheme: Who does what?



<u>Accreditation</u> **Authority**

- Exercises accreditation functions required by the National Board
- Develops and reviews accreditation standards
- Provides advice to National Board on accreditation matters
- Assesses education providers/ programs of study against accreditation standards
- Accredits programs of study
- Monitors accredited programs
- May assess internationally qualified health practitioners and/or accrediting and examining authorities to provide advice on practitioners' knowledge, clinical skills and professional attributes.



National Board

- Decides on its Accreditation Authority (council or committee)
- Approves accreditation standards
- Develops/reviews registration requirements and standards with wide public consultation
- Considers advice from Accreditation Authority
- Approves or refuses to approve an accredited program of study as providing a qualification for the purposes of registration
- Uses assessment advice to determine whether internationally qualified health practitioners are qualified for registration.



- Enters into contracts with accreditation councils
- Establishes procedures for development/review of accreditation and registration standards
- Provides support and advice to National Boards/Accreditation Committees in exercising their functions
- Publishes up-to-date list of approved programs
- Establishes/administers procedures for registration applications and other matters relating to health practitioner registration including internationally qualified health practitioners.



The Health Professions' Accreditation **Collaborative Forum**

The Health Professions' Accreditation Collaborative Forum (HPACF) is the coalition of entities appointed by the National Boards as Accreditation Authorities for the professions regulated under the National Law. The HPACF has since been meeting regularly since 2007, before the commencement of the Scheme. The HPACF considers matters of common interest, principally matters concerning the accreditation of education and training programs in the regulated health professions. The HPACF advocates for good accreditation practices. The HPACF engages with Ahpra and the National Boards and publishes a communique after each meeting.







Accreditation Committee

The Ahpra Board established the independently-chaired Accreditation Committee (the committee) consistent with Ministerial Council Policy Direction 2020-1- Independent Accreditation Committee to provide independent and expert advice on accreditation reform and other National Scheme accreditation matters to National Scheme entities (National Boards, Accreditation Authorities and Ahpra).

The committee's published work plans reflect its main work deliverables. The Committee also publishes communiques following each meeting.

Accreditation contributes to the safety and quality of the health system by providing a framework for evaluating whether individuals seeking registration have the knowledge, skills and professional capabilities to safely and competently practise their profession in Australia. This is a crucial quality assurance and risk management mechanism for the National Scheme.

What's new in accreditation?

Update on Accreditation Committee deliverables

In 2024/25 the Accreditation Committee (the committee) contributed to progress multiple deliverables as part of its published work plan.

The committee published its principles to strengthen the involvement of consumers in accreditation and draft guidance on clinical placements, simulationbased learning and virtual care in initial student health practitioner education in April 2025.

The Glossary of accreditation terms was integrated into accreditation documentation, training and communications to support a shared language and consistent understanding of the committee's advice across professions, National Scheme entities and external stakeholders

Principles for the use of outcome-based approaches to accreditation are in development to help ensure accreditation in the National Scheme is flexible, responsive, equitable and contributes to the provision of high-quality healthcare. It is anticipated that the proposal for public consultation on this work will be released in late 2025.

Common Capabilities Development

In March 2025, a working group was established to develop a set of common professional capabilities, for adoption by National Scheme professions in areas such as identifying and responding to family, domestic and sexual violence, digital health, cultural safety and mental health. The working group has drafted and developed an initial set of common professional capabilities and will be undergoing a series of testing with specialist expert groups and key stakeholders in late 2025.

HPACF update

Update from the Health Professions Accreditation Collaborative Forum (HPACF) –

- The Interprofessional Education initiative entered phase II and is developing guidance for accreditation authorities on expectations during accreditation visits.
- A new governance model has been implemented to address previous resourcing challenges and support future work.
- The Accreditation Managers Sub-committee is working with the University of Adelaide and University of South Australia to reduce regulatory burden during the merger of the two education providers to create Adelaide University.
- A working group is examining the implications of AI on accreditation and education.

Annual Accreditation Meeting

The second Annual Accreditation Meeting was held in September 2025. Following on from the themes of Accreditation Meeting held in 2024; the 2025 meeting had a stronger emphasis on workforce intersection with accreditation. Around 120 attendees from National Boards, Accreditation Authorities, Ahpra and other NRAS stakeholders attended.

The meeting allowed for wide-ranging discussion on a range of contemporary accreditation issues, the brainstorming of possible solutions to those issues and will foster a strengthened sense of collaboration and partnership in addressing the issues discussed.

Update on the Dawson review

The Dawson Review, formally known as the Independent Review of Complexity in the National Registration and Accreditation Scheme (NRAS), was initiated to address concerns about inefficiencies and inconsistencies in Australia's health practitioner regulation system. Ahpra welcomed the findings of the review aimed at streamlining regulatory processes, enhancing fairness and transparency and better aligning with public safety and community expectations. Ahpra and National Boards have commenced work on recommendations that are relevant to accreditation functions.

IPCP SOI Implementation

The committee published the Interprofessional Collaborative Practice (IPCP) Statement of Intent (SOI) in 2024 and has developed an implementation plan to define the key elements, expected outcomes and next steps to action the principles of the statement. The SOI is an important step towards achieving effective team-based and coordinated care across Australia. The implementation plan will include four approaches to utilise National Scheme and out of

Scheme levers to help better embed IPCP principles across the learning continuum for all regulated health practitioners.

Reducing Duplication in Accreditation Processes

Reducing duplication in accreditation processes within the National Scheme is a key priority in 2025. Focus groups have been conducted across Australia with accreditation authorities, accreditation assessors and education providers. The committee's working group is identifying priority activities for reducing duplication, to be tested with key stakeholders in 2026.
