#### **About this book**



This book is from the **Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency** or Ahpra.



Ahpra makes rules for **registered health practitioners** to keep you and other people safe.

Registered health practitioners are people who are allowed to give a health service to you.



This book is about the **code of conduct** for 12 practitioner roles in Australia.



Code of conduct means the rules that these practitioners **must** follow.

## Practitioners who must follow this code of conduct



## Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Practitioners

For example, an Aboriginal Person who does health care work in an Aboriginal community.



#### 2. Chinese medicine practitioners

For example, a Chinese medicine practitioner can give you acupuncture.



#### 3. Chiropractors

For example, a chiropractor can help you with back pain.



#### 4. Dental practitioners

For example, a dentist.



#### 5. Medical radiation practitioners

For example, a medical radiation practitioner can make x ray images of your bones.



#### 6. Occupational therapists

For example, an occupational therapist can teach you new skills for home or work.



#### 7. Optometrists

For example, an optometrist can care for your eyes.



#### 8. Osteopaths

For example, an osteopath can help you with neck pain.



#### 9. Paramedics

For example, a paramedic can care for you in an ambulance.



#### 10. Pharmacists

For example, a pharmacist can help when you need medicine.



### 11. Physiotherapists

For example, a physiotherapist can help you move after an injury.



#### 12. Podiatrists

For example, a podiatrist can help you with foot pain.

## Some practitioners follow other codes of conduct



Some practitioners have their own code of conduct and do **not** need to follow this one.



Your health practitioner does **not** need to follow this code of conduct if they work as a

doctor



nurse



#### midwife

a midwife cares for a woman who is having
 a baby



#### psychologist

a psychologist cares for your mental health.





This code of conduct says what the 12 practitioner roles **must** do for you.

### You have a right to get respect




The practitioners should be polite and respectful no matter

• where you come from



what you believe



what choices you make.



If you are an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander Person, you should get care that

• respects your culture



helps you feel safe.

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## You have a right to understand



The practitioners should

listen to you



• talk to you in a way you understand

• explain difficult things to you



• tell you if something goes wrong and why



• tell you the truth.

### You should get good care



You should feel like you are in good hands with the practitioners because of their

• experience



skills.



The practitioners should work with you and others to

• help you get the care you need



• help you be as healthy as possible



make your community healthier.



The practitioners **must** teach their students to also give you safe and good care.

## You have a right to see an expert



This code of conduct says the practitioners **must** 

know what is safe for you and others



• keep their skills up to date.



The practitioners should only give you the health care that they

are trained for



• can give you in a safe way.



The practitioners should know facts that a **treatment** works before they give it to you.



Treatment can include

medicine



health care.

## Your information is private



The practitioners **must** 

keep your health information written down in a safe place



 never share your information with other people unless you say yes.
