The revised guidelines explain that it is not an offence to fail to make a mandatory notification when required, but a National Board may take disciplinary action in this situation. 11. Is this made clear in the revised guidelines? Please explain your answer. Yes The information is clearly explained and easy to understand so practitioners are aware of their responsibilities 12. Is there anything that needs to be added to the revised guidelines? The revised guidelines appear to have covered the necessary aspects of what is required of treating and non treating practitioners when it comes to mandatory notifications 13. It is proposed that the guidelines will be reviewed every five years, or earlier if required. Is this reasonable? Please explain your answer. Yes Guidelines should be living documents to reflect changes and regulations in practice 14. Please describe anything else the National Boards should consider in the review of the guidelines. How these guidelines will be promoted to employers especially in the private sector if the employers are not health professionals and just owners of private clinics/schools/aged care facilities etc (often absentee owners) that are providing a health service within their other business. The employer will be in name only in some of these circumstances and therefore potentially not have clear oversight or even knowledge of their responsibilities. Inappropriate behaviour/sexual misconduct in a school setting or aged care facilities, as examples, are areas of concern when external providers are contracted to provide a service within these facilities.
