- approving accreditation standards and accredited courses of study.

#### Pandemic response sub-register

In April 2020, Ahpra and National Boards established a temporary pandemic response sub-register for up to 12 months to help fast track the return to the workforce of experienced and qualified health practitioners to assist with the COVID-19 pandemic. In early April 2021, the Commonwealth Health Minister requested that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Practitioners be extended to stay on the sub-register for up to 12 months to help with the COVID-19 vaccination program only. 

#### Table 1.2 Percentage by principal place of practice




